What are the main threats faced by Israel?

There are four major, inter-related threats: military, economic, demographic, and diplomatic-ideological threats.

Why do the threats persist despite Israel's successes? Israel continues to face ideologically extreme, powerful enemies, determined to adapt their methods to target Israel's vulnerabilities.

How has Israel succeeded?

By patiently and flexibly building strength, adapting well to new opportunities and threats.
