## Common Q&A's

How did North American campuses react to the Oct 7 massacre perpetrated by the internationally proscribed terrorist group Hamas?

Not by condemning the terrorist violence but by endorsing, celebrating, and calling for more violence against Jews, and doing so for months.

What role did the Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) movement play in generating the campus response?

By soaking many campuses for decades in lies about Israel (settler colonialism, genocide, ethnic cleansing, apartheid, "Jewish supremacy"), it successfully dehumanized and delegitimized Israeli Jews so that even Israeli Jewish civilians, even children, are legitimate targets of violence.

What role did the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) movement play in generating the campus response?

By soaking many campuses for years in the ideology of "oppressor v. oppressed," in turn identifying Jews as the most oppressive group that exploits its privilege to oppress all marginalized groups down, the movement dehumanized and delegitimized all Jews, even non-Israeli Jews, so that all Jews are legitimate targets of persecution and harassment.
