Common Q&A's

What is ISGAP doing to combat antisemitism?

ISGAP is training a network of scholars worldwide to teach critical contemporary antisemitism studies in Higher Education, researching foreign funding in universities, discussing findings on the podcast, *Follow The Money*, and presenting information to government leaders.

They are developing programs to educate the moderate majority about the radical ideology that shifts from classrooms to campus protests and to the streets.

What is the bad news? What is the good news?

The bad news is that the agenda to demonize Jews and Israel by influencing universities where people learn to be citizens was planned decades ago and has been coming to fruition in recent years and especially since October 8, 2023. The good news is that organizations like ISGAP are exposing the ideology that shapes much curriculum and growing networks worldwide to oppose it.

What are the most common libels against Israel?

Through classroom education and social media campaigns, the accusations are exposed as lies: 1) Israel is not a settler-colonial state, 2) Israel is not an apartheid state, 3) Israel does not commit genocide in Gaza.
